

<b>Course Title:</b> Polish as a foreign language – 60 hours.	
<b>Field of study:</b> To learn basic communicative and reading skills in Polish.	
<b>Level of course:</b> beginners	
<b>Objective:</b> achieving general competence in Polish at A1 level, in particular the following language skills: - listening comprehension: numerals, social language and simple questions - writing: ability to write simple words in Polish - speaking: using the language in everyday life situations - ability to interact in a shop, at a post office, asking for directions, talking about everyday activities and work, introducing yourself – nationality, age, knowledge of foreign languages, studies	
<b>Abilities:</b> after completing this course students will be able to: - introduce themselves and maintain a simple conversation (asking for directions, doing the shopping, talking about studies, work, everyday life, interests) - read in Polish and pronounce all sounds quite well - understand basic rules governing Polish grammar (declination and conjugation) - use a dictionary – ability to find an entry (in the Nominative case) and translate sentences
