TASK ACHIEVEMENT (maximum 4 marks)	Content	All points are covered. The <b>message</b> is <b>conveyed</b> and the task is achieved. The writing is of an appropriate <b>length</b> . (2 marks)
	Effect on target reader	The reader clearly <b>understands</b> the message. (1 mark)
	Register	The writing is <b>consistently</b> formal, informal, or neutral <b>as dictated by the task.</b> (1 mark)
ORGANISATION (maximum 2 marks)	General organisation	The organization is well-structured with a clear <b>beginning</b> , <b>middle</b> and end. It is divided into <b>paragraphs</b> . In letters, the appropriate <b>layout</b> and writing conventions are observed. (1 mark)
	Cohesion	There is little repetition of the same phrases. Not all the sentences are very short and simple. <b>Some complex sentences</b> are used thus demonstrating appropriate use of cohesive devices (linkers). (1 mark)
ACCURACY (maximum 4 marks)	Grammar	The grammar is <b>mostly accurate</b> . There may be some mistakes, but they do not impede understanding. (2 marks)
	Vocabulary	The vocabulary used is <b>appropriate for the topic</b> . The student demonstrates his /her ability to convey the message effectively. Repetition is generally avoided. (2 marks)

#### MARKING PROCEDURE

## Each category is marked, marks awarded and then scores totalled.

However, if the writing fails to address the topic, only ACCURACY will be marked (i.e. student can be awarded up to 4 marks).

### WORD COUNT

#### At B2 level tests students are asked to write 150-180 words.

The student is allowed to write 5% fewer words than required and 10% more words than allowed.

If the task calls for 150-180 words, the writing should have no more than 200 words and no fewer than 140 words.

If the writing is **too short**, **1 mark will be subtracted per 10 words under the minimum number** allowed. (in the above example: for every 10 words below 140)

If the writing is **too long**, **1 mark will be subtracted per 10 words over the maximum number** allowed. (in the above example: for every 10 words over 200)

### RECORDING MARKS

The following symbols are used: T for Task, O for Organisation, A for Accuracy and S for Score.

Each piece of writing is read by two examiners. Neither of the examiners underlines or corrects the mistakes.

The first examiner writes down his/her marks in a box provided in the bottom left-hand corner of the examination paper and folds up the corner so as not to influence the other examiner. The second examiner completes the box in the right-hand corner, unfolds the left-hand corner, and calculates the final score.

Half marks are rounded up (e.g. 5.5 to 6.0). In case of a significant divergence (3 marks or more) the two examiners negotiate the final score. If the two examiners cannot reach agreement, the decision is taken by a member of the Examination Board.
